President's Message

The summer is almost over, but the museum is getting ready for a busy fall. Since our summer trains ending on Labor Day weekend, we have been busy with projects and tasks getting ready for our Halloween trains and the Polar Express Event. Several volunteers have been working on the Oakwood Depot patio, installing the stations and railing around the perimeter. Steve Foust welded up all the rails and did a fantastic job. The patio will be a multipurpose area that can be used for a picnic area, a band stand, or can be decorated for photo ops during special events. Out plan is to have a large Christmas Tree up during Polar Express so families can take pictures.



Also on the grounds, track work has been in full swing. Crews from Lonestar Railroad contractors replaced mainline ties over the summer and once our train rides were finished in August, they continued tie replacement on several switches on main 1 & 2 and well as one yard track switch. They continued with installation on a new switch in the house track off main 2 north of the Depot. This switch allowed us to add an additional storage track the extends north to the north end of the barn. The crews also extended the house track to match as well as bumper posts. This track work is another part of our master expansion plan that we have been working towards the last few years.

The Fall Events Season starts Saturday, October 12th with The Annual Member's Picnic. Join us for a potluck lunch followed by a train ride. Saturday, October 19th is Retired Railroaders' Appreciation Day as well as the Fall Meeting of 'The Reading the Rails' Book Club. Additionally, my law degree has equipped me with a strong understanding of regulations and policies that can be of benefit to our museum.


My fascination with railroads began at a young age, with many of my family employed with various railroads throughout the country. I believe that



Oklahoma Historic Rail Equipment

Have you ever seen a caboose in a field, or an old depot building and wondered "Where did this come from? Are there any more out there?" I did too, and so after I found a couple incomplete lists and maps online, I started a map of historic railway equipment and structures in Oklahoma. The map can be found on the ORM website under Education – <u>Education Resources</u> or use the link above,

Currently marked on the map are just over 400 items, including 144 depots, 100 cabooses, 20 passenger cars, and 12 steam locomotives. I have also added points for 32 railway-related museums, from large ones like the ORM to small local history museums inside the town depot. I have been adding pictures to entries when I am able to take them, and the map is a continuous work in progress. I know there are more items out there not yet on the map, and I add them whenever I find them.

Historic Baldwin Comes Home to Oklahoma!

In 2016, the museum discovered that a unique locomotive was being decommissioned by the military. Locomotive USAX 4648, a Baldwin VO- 1000m, was one of two units that the Army was decommissioning. The other unit USAX4649, is now our Milwaukee Road 615 a EMD SW-1200 switcher. Like #4649, we researched the origin of 4648 and found it to be one the first Baldwin the Frisco Railroad purchased. Research at the time pointed to unit 206 from the built number (64433) provided by the Army which is part of the second batch of Baldwins the Frisco purchased in 1942. Once the unit arrived at the museum, we were able to verify 4648 was indeed 206 by the frame casting date of 1942. Some data on the internet points to unit 203, but that unit was delivered in 1941. We worked with our local government surplus program to request that the engine be donated to the Oklahoma Railway Museum. After years of delays and setbacks, #206 has finally come home to Oklahoma.

Frisco #206 was built in November 1942 and operated on the Frisco Railroad until the late 1970s, but it didn't stay the same over the years. In 1959, it was sent to La Grange, Illinois, to be repowered with an EMD 567C engine. Because the new engine was wider, the Baldwin hood had to be replaced with a wider EMD-style hood, giving it the look of a SW-1200 switcher. Frisco continued to run this engine and its sister Baldwins until 1979, when most of them were either traded in to EMD, sold, or scrapped. Our engine was one of the lucky ones—it was refurbished and began a new life with the US Navy. The Navy designated it as #65-00625 and assigned it to the Port Chicago Naval Magazine in California, where it shuttled munitions for naval ships. Around 2008, the U.S. Army took over operations, and the site became Military Ocean Terminal Concord in California. During this time, the locomotive was renumbered to USAX 4648.

Future plans for this unit are to return it to Frisco #206 and paint it Frisco's Mandiran Orange and white livery. These Baldwins had several different liveries over the years they were in service. The first order of 5 units, 200-204 were delivered in the *Zephyr Blue* and *Silver* paint livery, like the 4500-4502 series steam locomotives. A second livery was black with diagonal stripes and there were four variations of this with different styles of lettering. The Frisco later changed their paint scheme for diesel locomotives to a white and mandarin red and the 206 was repainted in these colors by 1967. The white and mandarin livery is a great paint scheme, and our hope is that it will draw visitors to our museum. Also, the earlier liveries were used before our locomotive was repowered and the EMD switcher hood installed.

Engine #206 traveled extensively on the Frisco Railroad, and we've found photos of it in Missouri, Kansas, Alabama, and Oklahoma and we are glad to have it back in it home turf.


